





- Share Food: Some animals don't have enough food. They planned to share the food so everyone could have enough to eat.




 Be Safe and help each other: They talked about how some animals were being hunted and captured by humans. They wanted to find a way to protect all the animals and help each other though they are all different.

The animals all agreed to work together to make the world a better place. They wanted to show humans how to be kind to animals and take care of the Earth.


They concluded that everybody matters, no one should be left out, no one is too small or too big. The world could become a better place for both humans and animals.


